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A Busy Month!

March has been a hectic month in school. We have had lots of sporting activity and have welcomed many visitors. Early in the month, the children shared their talent in our Dance Festival. Our football team have had mixed fortunes. Several closely run matches have resulted in us having a middle-of-the-table position as the season is drawing to a close. The children have been wonderful in preparing for the games and, once again, have been great ambassadors for our school.

Forty eight members of the school choir took part in the Sunderland Singing Festival. We were greatly disappointed to find out that the annual *City Sings* competition was not taking place this year, so it was with great joy that we learned of this opportunity to join with friends from other schools. Mrs Purvis said she felt our choir's performance was outstanding, consistently tuneful and very enjoyable. Despite the large number of children, behaviour was exemplary.

Our open afternoon was a lovely opportunity for the

children to share their achievements with their loved ones, in the context of a working classroom. We hope that it gave you an insight into school life from your child's perspective and helped you to monitor their progress.

The highlight of the month has undoubtedly been the Lenten fundraising activities. Almost 200 grown-ups enjoyed soup in school, prepared by the children and about £400 has been raised for St Cuthbert's Care. The charity is committed to helping improve the lives of some of the most vulnerable members of our communities, including people with profound disabilities, children in care, older people and those living on the margins of society. Firmly rooted in the Catholic faith, the charity's work is highly specialised and often in areas of high risk. Message from Tyne and Wear Fire Service:

It's no game playing with someone's life warns the fire and rescue service in its latest campaign

During the spring months of April and May, Tyne and Wear Fire and Rescue Service sees an increase in the number of

fires which are set deliberately.

Most of these fires occur on grassland, woodland, waste land, in fields, parks and playgrounds. They are usually started by young people setting fire to rubbish, grass, fly tipping, hedges and fences. Not only do these anti-social behaviour fires cause damage to property, the environment and tie up firefighters unnecessarily but they can also cause injuries and deaths; what may seem like a bit of fun can quickly spread and endanger lives.

The Fire and Rescue Service is asking parents to support them by finding out what their children are doing if they go out during the lighter nights. They want parents to back the campaign by making children aware of the dangers of setting fires deliberately – it's no game playing with someone's life.

Fire is unpredictable and dangerous, not only can it kill but deliberately setting a fire can leave you with a criminal record and scar you for life. young person being dropped off by his mum to play with his friends in a park. They decide to set a fire which is put out by fire crews who also receive a call to attend a road traffic collision (RTC). A fire crew from another station attends the RTC whilst the local crew is busy putting out the rubbish fire started as a bit of fun.

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Breakfast Club

Our breakfast club is growing in popularity and we now have Mrs Kennedy as well as Mrs Darwin and Mrs Stark looking after the children. Because of increasing numbers we have a need for more toys to keep the children busy and welcome donations of lego or stickle bricks. Please let Mrs Ludford know if you have any that you are willing to part with! Breakfast club costs £2 per day, per child and the children are offered cereal, toast, fresh fruit, milk and juice. We feel this is good value but we can only continue if all our costs are met, so please make sure you make swift payment for the service. Please note also, that the club runs from 8am. Adults on the premises are unable to take responsibility for the children before this time and so children must not be left unattended. Thank you for your understanding.

Building Work

At long last we are beginning to see some progress with our building work. Extensions are taking part in four different areas in school and therefore we are having to be very patient! Unexpectedly we were told that our EYFS area had to be evacuated sooner than anticipated and all EYFS as well as Mondrian and Constable classes will be relocating after the Easter holidays. To facilitate this additional work has taken place to convert the library and office area into a classroom. Thank you for your

understanding during this challenging time.

Online Safety

Recently I have dealt with a number of concerns relating to e-safety issues created outside of school. If your child has a mobile telephone and accesses social media sites please monitor their actions closely. We recognise that our children understand the dangers of internet use but, unfortunately, they sometimes have difficulty in relating this to their own activities. To help you to gain a full understanding of current trends we will be hosting an e-safety workshop for parents on 20 April, (more details to follow.) The older children will also be given additional lessons on managing online activities. Most of the concerns I am asked to help with relate to *Instagram*, *Snapchat* and *Youtube*, all of which state that a child must be 13 to hold an account. I also have dealt with a number of concerns relating to children sending unacceptable text messages, often very late at night.
